HUTTON PARISH COUNCIL PROJECTS CURRENTLY IN PROGRESS

At the September meeting of the Parish Council it was agreed that they should purchase one additional bench made from re-cycled plastic. The bench is to be located on a new concrete slab on Pope Lane adjacent to the bus shelter at the end of Lindle Lane.

At the time of writing this newsletter we can report some progress in obtaining authorisation from owners for placing large planters containing trees on the apron at the front of the shops in the Village centre. However before this project can be taken further two companies authorisation is still required.

Further meetings have taken place with the Lancashire Wildlife Trust regarding the project to breathe new life and improve the appearance of the duck pond located in the Village car park. It is also clear from the discussions so far that this will be a major undertaking which is likely to be carried out in stages over a considerable amount of time.

Authorisation has now been received from Lancashire County Council to prepare a scheme for the crescent shaped area of grass at the Hutton roundabout and in front of the car wash premises to improve the appearance of the entrance to the Village centre.



INCONSIDERATE PARKING

Inconsiderate parking can mean blocking the pavement for pedestrians especially children, people with visual impairment, vulnerable people, wheelchairs, zimmer frames or pushchairs. Obviously any of these are in danger if they have to go on to the road because their way is blocked by a parked car. This has been a constant problem and is getting worse. Some people with visual impairment or disabilities do not leave their homes at all because it is too dangerous to walk in some areas. Please think exactly where you are parking and the difficulties and danger that this could cause. If you must park on a pavement, leave room for pavement users. Don't park in such a way that it is impossible for someone to get out of their drive. Don't Double Park if this would mean that emergency vehicles are unable to get past. Don't park in such a way that you block the full width of the pavement. Leave a little more time for your journey so that if parking considerately means you have to walk a little further, you have the time to do so.

One Hundred years 100 YEARS AGO SAW THE END OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR 100 YEARS AGO WOMEN WERE FIRST ALLOWED TO VOTE IN GREAT BRITAIN 100 YEARS AGO HUTTON AND HOWICK WI WAS FORMED

1918 was a very important year. The commemorations and celebrations have been, and are still wide and varied. It would seem wrong not to mention the centenary of local group Hutton and Howick WI in this context. The lives of women changed drastically during WW1: many of their menfolk were far away fighting for their country and of course, many did not return. The women of Britain took on jobs in factories or on the land that had previously only been done by men. This meant a different view on life and having to fend for themselves and their families out of necessity. After the end of the war many women felt that they still needed a voice and to retain some of the independence that they had during the war years. Out of this situation, the Women's Institute movement was born. Edith Rigby, a militant Preston Suffragette was the first President of Hutton and Howick WI. There have been celebrations during the year linking the Suffragette movement to this lively local WI. Their craft group, walking group, committee and all the members have been involved. From planting marigolds in a local school garden to joining in local Suffragette celebrations, retracing the steps of Edith Rigby, and a visit from Seema Kennedy.MP. There was also a visit by Michael Portillo who visited Hutton and Howick WI to learn about Edith Rigby and her connection with the WI. He thoroughly enjoyed a lively afternoon with the ladies in their suffragette costumes. The result is expected to be on TV early in 2019. All this culminating in a Birthday Party in December in evening or cocktail wear presided over by the Mayor of South Ribble. The PACT process gives you the chance to speak to your neighbourhood policing team every month, have a say on how your neighbourhood is policed and monitor our performance. The way that we deliver PACT is changing to meet the needs of local communities and make best use of technology to make PACT more accessible, We understand that it can be difficult for you to physically attend a meeting during the evening, when you might have other commitments or find it difficult to get transport. We have recently introduced E-PACT, where we are running virtual meetings online and also mixing physical with online meetings either on Facebook or using new products such as Google Hangouts.

You can find out when and where your next PACT or E-PACT meeting is by following your local policing team on social media.

During the PACT meeting you can tell your neighbourhood policing team what issues concern you, ask them questions about how we are policing your area and each month we will decide which policing priorities we will be concentrating on in your area for the next month, based upon your concerns and questions.

The neighbourhood policing team will report back to the next meeting with progress on solving your issues sometimes working with other agencies to achieve this
